#### **SYLLABUS**

**COURSE TITLE:** Spanish as a Foreign Language-Beginner Level

**COURSE CODE:** ESP 191

PRERREQUISITE: None

**CREDITS:** Three (3) credits, meets 3 times a week

## **DESCRIPTION**

This course analyzes language with a focus on communication. Students will encounter the new language in the dimension of social use in which the learner is perceived as a social agent with tasks to complete. Thus, they must activate general and linguistic competencies of communication. In addition to social use of the language, this course includes a multicultural dimension and the dimension of language learning itself. The course will be offered completely online.

# **JUSTIFICATION**

All foreign language learners should know the basic elements that constitute the system of the language in question and be able to handle typical communication scenarios arising in social interaction. The course seeks to enable the student in three relevant aspects: transactions necessary for fulfilling personal needs, social interaction as a member of society and oral and written texts with which the student may engage according to his/her/their needs and objectives.

# **OBJECTIVES**

Upon completing the first level, students will have achieved the following:

- 1. They will possess a limited repertoire of phrases for specific situations, which they will have practiced and organized lexically.
- 2. They will be able to carry out simple interactions with the collaboration of the interlocutor.

- 3. They will possess the resources to satisfy immediate needs related to daily situations.
- 4. They will possess rudimentary linguistic resources, allowing them to participate in a simple manner in conversations and achieve comprehension.
- 5. They will able to comprehend short, simple texts with a clear structure.
- 6. They will be able to grasp undistorted oral texts pronounced slowly with pauses.
- 7. They will appreciate cultural diversity and the impact one's native culture exerts on the perception and interpretation of other cultures.

# **METHODOLOGY**

This course is designed in such a manner that content is integrated with in-class activities. Readings of short essays with specific difficulty levels aids morphological and syntactic explanation, such that the course is more than a mere means of acquiring information. Constant oral and written participation will facilitate the initial diagnosis

of each students' level and the measurement of individual progress. Daily activities include dialogues, oral presentation and writing. Thus, students incorporate acquisition of vocabulary, grammar, pronunciation and spelling in a foreign language learning process that will prepare them to adapt to their environment socially and culturally.

The number of students never exceeds ten, as this course requires ongoing, individualized attention.

## **EVALUATION**

A variety of activities to elicit the use and practice of knowledge acquired. These will include tasks in which individual and group work are aimed at a specific purpose within the learning process.
